Justice-Involved Children, Youth, and Families Programs: Reducing Risk for Girls in the Juvenile Justice System

This program provides funding for communities to support girls who are involved in the juvenile justice system. The program will support communities to develop, enhance, or expand early intervention programs and/or treatment services for girls involved in the juvenile justice system.

ELIGIBLE ENTITIES:

- City or township governments, County governments, For profit organizations other than small businesses, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments), Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, Private institutions of higher education, Private controlled institutions of higher education, State governments, Other (Tribal institutions of higher education).
- Applications submitted by nongovernmental organizations must have an established partnership via a memorandum of understanding (MOU) or analogous document with public juvenile justice agencies at the local or state level. This will ensure close collaboration around referrals for those girls involved in the juvenile justice system and who are eligible for services provided by the proposed project. A fully executed MOU or analogous document must be included as an attachment with the submitted application to be considered for funding.

- Applicants are required to include costs to participate in an annual grantee meeting hosted by the training and technical assistance provider for the program.
